## **Content and Process in Medical Communication**

This paper explores the various ways in which content and process can be combined in the Medical English class with a specific focus on the Calgary-Cambridge framework. New approaches have been developed in recent years, but they should be balanced by a straightforward teaching of the social, political, historical, and medical-technical structures at play in contemporary practice.
